

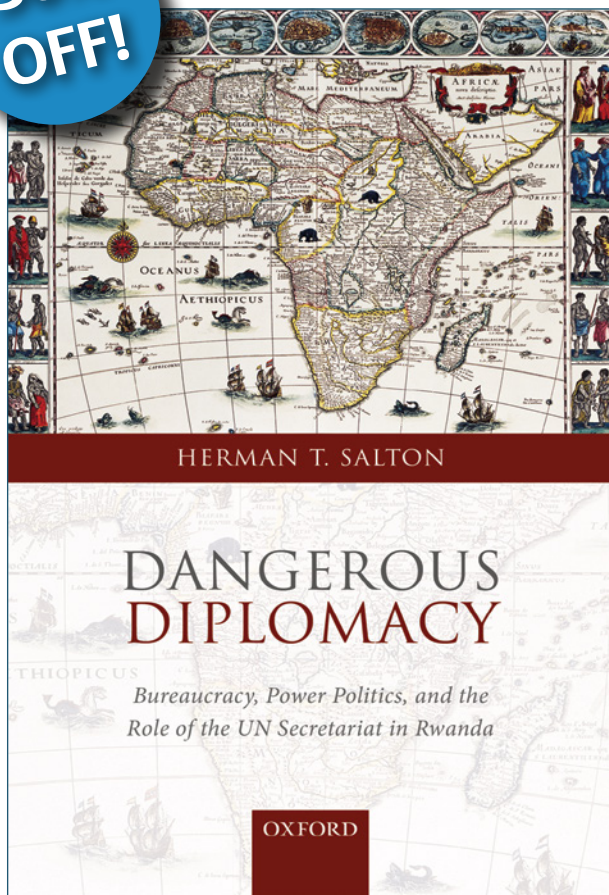

Dangerous Diplomacy reassesses the role of the UN Secretariat during the Rwandan genocide. With the inclusion of the personal diaries and private papers of the late Sir Marrack Goulding, the book situates the Rwanda operation within the context of bureaucratic and power-political friction existing at UN Headquarters in the early 1990s. The book shows how this confrontation led to a lack of coordination between key UN departments on issues of reconnaissance, intelligence, and crisis management. It also identifies the conceptual origins of the Rwanda failure in the area that separates peacebuilding and peacekeeping. The difficulty of dividing these two UN functions explains why seventy years after the birth of the UN, it has still not been possible to demarcate the roles of key UN departments.
